

Pedorthic Exam Candidate Self Assessment Checklist

Prior to sitting for the ABC Certified Pedorthist exam, each candidate is required to complete 1,000 hours of pedorthic experience. The following self assessment tool gives you a guideline for what areas you should focus on and the amount of time you should be spending in each area during this period.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION

This checklist is for your use only and is not required as part of your application for the exam.

Use it as a tool to guide you through your work experience and to make sure that you are getting the type and amount of experience in each area that the profession expects.

DOMAINS OF PRACTICE

Certified Pedorthists (C.Ped's) report that they spend their professional time divided between five areas of responsibility called **Domains of Practice**. As you work on the 1,000 hour experience requirement to take the ABC C.Ped. exam, you should gain experience in each domain and arrange your time to approximately meet these percentages. Use the following chart to write in the percentage of time you spend in each domain.

Each domain is broken down into specific tasks. Reference the ABC *Pedorthic Candidate Guide* for the specific tasks associated with each domain and identify the domains in which you should spend more or less time.

Implementation of the Treatment Plan Perform procedures necessary to provide the appropriate pedorthic services, including fabrication.	24%	%
Continuation of the Treatment Plan Provide continuing patient care and periodic evaluation to assure/maintain/document optimal fit and function of the pedorthic device.	14%	%
Practice Management Develop, implement and/or monitor policies and procedures regarding human resources, the physical environment, business and financial practices and organizational management.	10%	%
